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LETTER FROM THE MAYOR



Dear Washingtonians,

We are fortunate in DC that since 2015, our city has experienced tremendous economic growth. This growth has allowed us to make significant investments in our people and neighborhoods – we've modernized schools and libraries, added thousands of affordable homes, transformed our waterfront and created new destinations across DC, and launched and expanded innovative human services programs that are giving more Washingtonians a fair shot.

Today, even as we face a confluence of post-COVID factors, our city is still strong. We continue to have a Aaa bond rating. DC is the number one city in the country for tech careers and among the top cities for women-owned business openings. We are leading the country in office-to-housing conversions. Tourism is rebounding. Our public school enrollment is up two years in a row. Crime is trending down. And unlike many of our peer cities, DC's population is growing.

With more than 1,400 units proposed by 2025, DC is leading the country in office-to-housing conversions.



In 2023, total enrollment in public schools increased for the second consecutive year to 98,649 students in DC Public Schools and public charter schools.



In February 2024, Metro rail and bus service had a **20% increase** over February 2023 and weekend ridership had fully recovered. To help close WMATA's projected FY25 operating budget deficit, the District provided \$200 million on top of our FY24 operating subsidy.

EDUCATION

Our public schools have been a bright spot in the renaissance of Washington, DC, and they will continue to play a critical role in our comeback.

Since the pandemic,
DC Public Schools
(DCPS) has remained
the single fastestimproving urban school
system in reading —
with 4th-grade students
completely recovering
— and the third fastest
in math.

Since 2015, we have grown our public education budget from \$1.4 billion to \$2.7 billion.

The Advanced Technical Center (ATC) is a central piece of the Bowser Administration's efforts to reimagine the high school experience and set students on a pathway to the middle class. The ATC provides DC students with career-focused opportunities to acquire professional skills, earn industry credentials, and gain college credits in high-demand, high-wage careers such as cybersecurity and general nursing.





DCPS:

- The contract approved in December 2022 gave DCPS teachers a 12% increase in salary over four years and a 4% retention bonus.
- Last year, DCPS retained 95% of effective and highly effective teachers.

WORKFORCE



In November 2023, Mayor Bowser and the Department of Employment Services (DOES) announced the HBCU Public Service Program to create a pathway to public service for graduating seniors of Howard University and the University of the District of Columbia (UDC). Starting June 2024, 25 graduates will be placed in District agencies for a year, and will be eligible for full-time District Government employment after their apprenticeship.

PUBLIC SAFETY



Throughout 2023, Mayor Bowser worked to rebalance our city's public safety and justice ecosystem so that, above all else, it prioritizes the safety of our community. Washington, DC is a city that is committed to creating opportunity and believes in second chances. As we connect people to those opportunities, we must also work together as a community to send a clear message that we will not tolerate violence.

In May 2023, Mayor Bowser introduced the Safer Stronger Amendment Act of 2023, with provisions like expanded pre-trial detention. That summer, the Council passed a package of emergency legislation, and those policies began to bend crime trends down.

In October 2023, Mayor
Bowser introduced the
Addressing Crime Trends
Now Act (ACT Now) to
address public safety
challenges by giving
law enforcement more
tools to hold criminals
accountable and keep
neighborhoods safe.

On March 11, 2024,
Mayor Bowser signed
Councilmember Brooke
Pinto's Secure DC
legislation, which includes
provisions from Safer
Stronger 2.0 and ACT
Now, into law.



Staffed by outreach teams from public safety, human services, behavioral health, and community relations agencies, the new Safe Commercial Corridor Hubs in Chinatown and Anacostia connect residents to a range of city services with a specific focus on working across government to keep the corridors safe and clean.

Mayor Bowser increased the hiring bonus for new MPD recruits from \$20,000 to \$25,000, with up to \$6,000 in rental assistance also available. Interested in joining MPD? Visit joinmpd.dc.gov



In 2023, the Fire and
Emergency Medical Services
Department (FEMS)
responded to 210,998 calls for service, including more than
33,000 fire calls and more than 167,000 EMS calls.



In 2023, the Office of Unified
Communications (OUC) handled
nearly 1.8 million emergency 911 calls
and nearly 1.5 million non-emergency/
city service 311 calls. The District's 911
call center is one of the busiest in the
country, historically ranking as the 4th
busiest center behind those of New York
City, Chicago, and Los Angeles.



Mayor Bowser is funding a new DC Jail to replace the aging Central Detention Facility. A modern, secure, and resilient Department of Corrections facility will use evidence-based practices that support residents' safe return to the community and reduce recidivism.

BUILDING A STRONGER, HEALTHIER DC

One thing we know: When people get the right care at the right time, they will have better outcomes. By building a robust system of care that addresses the wide range of physical, mental, and behavioral health care needs in our community, we can build a stronger, healthier DC.



Mayor Bowser and the Department of Behavioral Health (DBH) opened the District's first Stabilization Center to provide immediate crisis intervention, typically lasting 24-72 hours, for those experiencing substance use disorder. Since its opening in October 2023, the Stabilization Center has provided services to 1,540 community members.

In October, the Child and Family Services Agency (CFSA) launched the 211 warmline. This will voluntarily connect children, families, and community members to DC Government systems of care and community-based services and prevent unnecessary investigations by Child Protective Services.



A new Whole Blood Program, an initiative designed to support and train paramedics in performing pre-hospital blood transfusions in partnership with the American Red Cross, will increase survival rates by decreasing the amount of time it takes to replace lost blood.



In 2023, Mayor Bowser announced that the District will cancel up to \$90 million in medical debt for many of the 90,000 District residents who have unpaid medical bills.

A NEW HEALTH CARE CORRIDOR EAST OF THE RIVER



Mayor Bowser and Dr. Ayanna Bennett, the Director of DC Health, cut the ribbon on the new DC Health headquarters in historic Anacostia, bringing nearly 700 DC Health employees to the neighborhood.

Universal Health Services (UHS) cut the ribbon on the new Cedar Hill Urgent Care GW Health. The clinic is now serving over 12,000 patients a year.



Mayor Bowser joined Whitman-Walker to open the new Max Robinson Center on the St. Elizabeths East campus.

Currently under construction on the St. Elizabeths East campus, the new full-service Cedar Hill Regional Medical Center GW Health will open in 2025.

Mayor Bowser and Universal Health Services (UHS) announced a plan to bring new emergency services to Ward 7 on the Fletcher-Johnson campus. The new freestanding emergency department will provide 24/7, hospital-quality emergency services for patients of all ages, from pediatrics to seniors, with a full-service emergency room staffed with an experienced team including board-certified emergency medicine physicians, ER nurses, and ER techs.

BUILDING A STRONGER, MORE RESILIENT DC



In November, Mayor Bowser and the District Department of Transportation (DDOT) celebrated 50% completion of the DC Smart Street Lighting Project, which has modernized almost 40,000 streetlights across DC.



Department of Energy and Environment (DOEE) helped 2,005 low-income households access solar energy and benefits in FY23.



While attending the COP28
Local Climate Action Summit,
Mayor Bowser released
Carbon Free DC, a strategy
for DC to achieve carbon
neutrality by 2045. Carbon
Free DC will continue DC's
legacy as a sustainability
pioneer and help address the
drivers of emissions.

In July 2023, Mayor Bowser and community members kicked off the transformation of "Dave Thomas Circle." This long-awaited infrastructure project will significantly improve the Florida Avenue and New York Avenue NE intersection. improving safety for all who move through it and creating new green space. Public spaces at the transformed intersection will be named Mamie "Peanut" Johnson Plaza in honor of the late women's baseball pioneer.



Mayor Bowser established the Bus Priority Program in order to improve access to opportunity for District residents across all eight wards. Through the program, the amount of bus lanes in the District has grown from less than a mile to over 13 lanemiles built or under construction. DDOT is delivering on the Mayor's historic commitment to deliver 51 bus priority projects, with five projects completed and 17 in active planning, design, or construction.





Over five miles of the Metropolitan Branch Trail (MBT) have already been completed, starting at Union Station, going up through Eckington, Edgewood, Brookland, and Fort Totten. The current trail sees over 2,500 bicyclists and pedestrians per day! The Fort Totten to Takoma section will complete nearly two miles of trail, making the trail within DC nearly complete. The Mayor's budget funds the final segment between Blair Road and Piney Branch Road in Takoma, which will be completed in 2027.

In 2023, the Department of Public Works (DPW) launched a Curbside Composting Pilot Program for residents in all eight wards. Almost 9,000 households are participating, and DPW has collected almost 300 tons of food waste to be repurposed into compost.

The Vitality Fund is an investment program designed to bring businesses to Downtown DC by supporting their relocations or expansions.

- Mayor Bowser has announced six companies that are recipients of the Vitality Fund and that will expand their presence in Downtown DC.
- Together, these companies will occupy nearly 150,000 square feet of office space, creating over 530 jobs in the process.

The Commercial Property Acquisition Fund

provides eligible DC-based businesses (equity impact enterprise businesses or businesses eligible to be a certified equity impact enterprise) with down payment assistance of up to \$750,000 or 25% of the sale price, whichever is less, for acquiring commercial property in the District.

In January 2023, the community came together to celebrate the Spice Suite's new home in the Langdon neighborhood of Ward 5. The Spice Suite is part of owner Angel Gregorio's larger vision: Black and Forth. Black and Forth is a block of commercial space that will house multiple Black, woman-owned small businesses.



In December, Mayor Bowser cut the ribbon on Miss Toya's Southern Cajun Kitchen, a new, Black-owned restaurant in Ward 7 and a Food Access Fund recipient. Since launching the Food Access Fund in 2021, Mayor Bowser has invested almost \$40 million to increase access to grocery stores, restaurants, fastcasual restaurants, and other food access points, with a focus on Wards 7 and 8.



Sala Thai and Duffy's Irish Pub both opened in Hill East in late 2023 and each received support from the Food Access Fund.



The transformation of the St. Elizabeths 'East campus represents Mayor Bowser's commitment to ensuring that the residents of Ward 8 have equal access to amenities and opportunities. To date, the District has invested nearly \$900 million into the campus, delivering:

DC hosted the 2023 Major League Soccer All-Star Game, with a sell-out crowd of 20,621 fans in attendance.



Beginning in 2023, the Washington Spirit began playing all home games at Audi Field, also the home of DC United and the DC Defenders.



The Fields at RFK – 27 acres of asphalt transformed into three state-of-the-art artificial turf recreational fields and other amenities – continue to host community events like the RFK Day of Play. In February 2024, the U.S. House of Representatives passed H.R. 4984, bipartisan legislation that would transfer administrative jurisdiction of the RFK campus to the District, allowing for a mix of uses.



In neighborhoods across DC, from the waterfront to Union Market, our community has witnessed and enjoyed the transformation of old spaces into new uses. Mayor Bowser created the Gallery Place/Chinatown Task Force to focus on potential future uses of the Capital One Arena, Gallery Place, and the surrounding blocks. This team of experts is charged with creating an immediate activation plan, long-term vision, and investment plan for a re-energized Gallery Place/Chinatown neighborhood.


Identify temporary and permanent activation programs, including special events, to increase visitation to Gallery Place/Chinatown, with public safety, cleanliness, and public health resources in mind.
